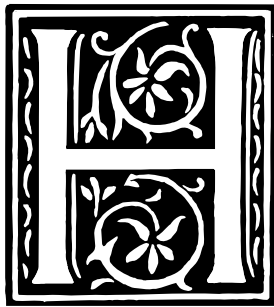

History Corner

Did you know that through the library you have access to digitized archives of local newspapers dating back to 1827? They are searchable by date and keyword so that you can find the articles most relevant to your research.

With our upcoming Book Club Bar Crawl dates this summer, we did a little digging and discovered that book clubs are nothing new to Trumansburg. We were tickled by this quote from the Trumansburg Free Press and Sentinel on January 27, 1900.

"The members of the Book Club are requested to be prompt in passing the books along at the expiration of the period. A neglect to do so may put 30 to 40 people to inconvenience and interfere with the machinery of the system."

A later issue from June of 1901 includes a more friendly reminder.

"About half of the books belonging to the book club have been handed in...will those who have club books kindly look them up and deliver to Miss Flickinger."

A Note from the Summer Reading Coordinator

We'll be blasting off into our space-themed summer reading program before you know it! We are excited for our program lineup, including guests from the Tanglewood Nature Center, Museum of the Earth, and Cornell's Spacecraft Planetary Imaging Facility who are bringing their Magic Planet. This year will bring a couple new changes to our children's programming. Instead of having programs on the same day of the week at the same time every week, we are *spacing* them out (Space! Get it?) on different days and offering programs in the morning, afternoon, and early evening. This way, we hope to meet the needs of many families with many different schedules, and offer a fun, cosmic program for everyone. Look for these special programs in the yellow-colored days on the summer reading calendar!

Last year we introduced reading-log bookmarks which replaced the bingo cards of previous summers. Kids can color in the bookmarks to help keep track of their reading,

and tuck it in their book to keep their place (and their bookmark!) safe. When they complete a bookmark, they can turn it in and take a new one, as many times as they want through the end of August. Like last year, each completed bookmark turned into the library comes with a reward! There will of course be prizes in the prize bin, but this year they will have an alternative option if the thrill of stickers and small toys has worn off. Upon completion of each bookmark, the child can choose either a prize or a token worth 25 cents. Then they can drop their token into a box for one of three non-profits: The Trumansburg Food Pantry, The Trumansburg Community Nursery School, or the Kopernik Observatory located in Vestal.
